COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The Well-Ordered Language series presents the study of language in a way that appeals to a child's inborn curiosity and desire to collect, gather, and order. It teaches grammar in a clear, orderly way, while simultaneously seeking to cultivate a child's wonder of language by presenting instruction in the context of narrative and language, attractive illustrations, and samples taken from classic children's literature and poetry. This course is designed for students to actively engage with the grammatical concepts in each lesson, using language skills—reading, writing, speaking and listening—along with physical movement, songs, and chants. Through Well-Ordered Language's unique, creative, and orderly method of analyzing the grammatical functions of the parts of speech, students will find the mastery of grammar achievable, meaningful, and delightful.

In the first semester, students encounter the following concepts: the four kinds of sentences (declarative, interrogatory, imperative, and exclamatory), subjects and predicates, verbs, adjectives, direct objects, subject pronouns, and helping verbs. In the second semester, students are introduced to object pronouns, prepositional phrases (adverbial), introductory prepositional phrases, compound subjects, compound verbs, and compound direct objects. Your student will learn the principles of English language grammar, including:

- The function of the four kinds of sentences
- The usage of the eight parts of speech
- The development of phrases and sentences
- The development of compound phrases and sentences
- The purpose of written and spoken language through recitation, prose, and poetry

The study of grammar allows your student to learn how to develop clear thoughts and craft mas-terful language. Grammar can be applied to written and spoken language. During our course of study, your student will develop a mindset of grammar by:

- Use of mnemonic aids, such as songs and chants, to strengthen memory and develop knowl-edge of sentence type and structure
- Construct well-written and well-spoken sentences
- Analyze the parts and function of sentences through sentence diagram

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS: EXECUTIVE FUNCTION SKILLS

Students enrolled in this course will be expected to show development and eagerness in the skills needed to be a successful in their current and future courses. These skills include a student who:

1. Engages in Learning. Students will strive for mastery of the concepts learned and reviewed in the class. Students should be prepared to actively participate in class and

throughly com- plete assignments. Students should show virtue through their diligence, and when necessary, willingness to ask questions.

- 2. Pays Attention to Detail. Students will thoughtfully complete their assignments. They will carefully review their work prior to submitting it. They will ensure that their work is legibleand coherent prior to submitting for grading. Students will also ensure that assignments in-clude their name and the date.
- **3. Prepares and Exhibits Responsibility.** Students will arrive to class on time and complete of assignments. The instructor will facilitate learning and provide support, but the stu- dent will be expected to attend class, participate in learning, and complete assignments within their due dates.
- 4. **Practices Self-Control.** Students will practice self-control through their respect of themselves, their classmates, and their instructor. They will practice hand-raising, listening to others, thoughtful responses, and focusing on the task. Students will participant in classes by paying attention, speaking when called upon, and consistently completing coursework assassigned.
- **5. Solves Problems and Receives Feedback.** Students will work independently, together, and with their instructor to solve problems and master concepts being learned. Students will practice giving and receiving feedback on their problem solving skills and their answers through regular interaction with the classmates and their instructor.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS IN ACTION

Students enrolled in this course will be expected to exhibit the skills and virtues associated with a scholar of goodness, truth, and beauty. Students enrolled in this course are expected to respectfully participant in classroom discussions and activities. They will also be assigned activities to support their learning.

In this class, students will be expected to listen attentively, participate actively in class discussions and practices. Students are expected to arrive to class on time and with all assigned material completed. The instructor will facilitate learning for the student, but the responsibility for staying up-to-date with classwork and assignments ultimately falls to the student.

All assignments will be due into the appropriate Schoology Assignment folder prior to the start of class each day. Students will submit their work by scanning their homework pagesand uploading it into the Schoology assignment window. Photographs of completed as- signments will not be accepted as they are incredibly dif[icult to read.

STUDENT EVALUATION: GRADING

While pursing the *Well-Ordered Language 1* through Scholé Academy will be "restful", we also recognize the need to provide grades for students who will be using this course as part of their prepared college transcript. It's a delicate balance to achieve both restful learning and excellent academic performance. Earning a speci[ic grade should not overshadow achievement goals for mastery of this discipline.

Well-Ordered Language 1 consists of a study of grammar and uses of language. The concept of restful learning and the classical education principles of seeking Truth, Goodness, and Beauty will be explored through the analysis and application of foundational language rules, known as grammar. As the teacher, I can assign the following grades to your student's level of achievement: magna cum laude (with great praise); cum laude (with praise); satis (suf[icient, satisfactory) and non satis (not suf[icient).

Ideally, every average student working diligently should do praiseworthy work (cum laude). Those who excel beyond this expectation will be the *magna cum laude* students. Students who do adequate but not praiseworthy work be designated *satis*. *Non satis* means lacking suf[iciency or adequacy.

Inasmuch as you might be fully on board with this grading method in theory, there will undoubtedly be the need to complete a college transcript with either a numeric or traditional letter grade. Traditional percentage grades will be provided and will be readily accessed on the *Well-Ordered Language 1* Schoology page. Additionally, Mrs. Maldonado will provide a transcript of that grade to the requesting parent at the end of the year.

STUDENT EVALUATION: MASTERY PORTRAIT

Mastery portrait: Students who take this course are typically in the 4th or 5th grade. This is a foundational course for their development of written and spoken language. The student who completes this course with highest honors will have exhibited diligence and virtue during the duration of the course. Students will be exposed to language through implicit study of grammar and analysis of prose and poetry.

By the end of the course, a student who has mastered the concepts of the course and receive *magna cum laude* will:

- Recognize the four kinds of sentences
- Define and use the eight parts of speech
- Develop well-crafted and elegant sentences
- Analyze the purpose and mechanics of written and spoken language.

STUDENT EVALUATION: ASSIGNMENTS, TYPES & WEIGHTS

Mrs. Maldonado will communicate with students regarding assignment feedback and grad-ing through the free online grading system, Schoology. The teacher will provide students with more detailed information and access to the *Well-Ordered Language* course page.

STUDENT EVALUATION: ACADEMIC DISHONESTY
