CLASS DESCRIPTION:

"The human body includes right from the beginning...the capacity of expressing love, that love in which the person becomes a gift – and by means of this gift – fulfills the meaning of his being and existence."

- St. John Paul II, Theology of the Body, January 16, 1980

From September 1979 through November 1984, (Pope) St. John Paul II gave a series of 129 papal addresses we now refer to as the Theology of the Body. In these addresses, St. John Paul II shared theological and philosophical wisdom that was many years in the making during his time serving the church prior to becoming pope. In his teaching on human sexuality, marriage, and family life, he centered on the dignity of the human person and the reality that man cannot fully understand his own identity without existing with someone and further, existing for someone else. That is, unless he makes a sincere gift of self, man cannot participate in love as a part of God's original plan for us.

In this course, we will lay the groundwork for the Theology of the Body through learning about who St. John Paul II (Karol Wojtyla) was before he became pope. We will discover how his theological considerations on human sexuality were formative in the Church and will continue to be increasingly necessary to promote truth, beauty, and goodness in our modern culture. Through studying his teaching on the human person and our relationship to God and each other, we will learn more about our Godgiven identities which can help us find our place in the world and lead us to the God who loved us into existence.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS IN ACTION

Our class will be held once a week on Thursdays. As this is a once-a-week class, staying on top of readings and maintaining regular attendance is very important. Students will be expected to complete all reading assignments on time and come to each class ready to ask questions and participate in discussion.

Each quarter there will be an essay assigned and students will be graded on their knowledge of the course material as well as their ability to show theological reflection. Grammar and syntax will only be critiqued if it strongly detracts from showing one's understanding. Spiritual development and growth are of a greater importance than technical skill in this course.

STUDENT EVALUATION: GRADING

While pursing the course *Theology of the Body: Foundations* through Scholé Academy will be restful and prayerful, we also recognize the need to provide grades for students who will be using this course as part of their transcript. It's a delicate balance to achieve both restful learning and excellent academic performance. Earning a specific grade should not overshadow achievement goals for beginning to explore one's inner spiritual life. Active participation and the ability to challenge oneself through introspective writing and discussion will allow me to assign the following grades to your

student's level of achievement: magna cum laude (with great praise); cum laude (with praise); satis (sufficient, satisfactory) and non satis (not sufficient).

Ideally, every average student working diligently should do praiseworthy work (cum laude). Those who excel beyond this expectation will be the *magna cum laude* students. Students who do adequate but not praiseworthy work be designated *satis*. *Non satis* means lacking sufficiency or adequacy.

Inasmuch as you might be fully on board with this grading method in theory, there will undoubtedly be the need to complete a transcript with either a numeric or traditional letter grade. Traditional percentage grades will be provided and will be readily accessed on the *Theology of the Body: Foundations* Canvas page. Additionally, Mrs. Minehart will provide a transcript of that grade to the requesting parent at the end of the year.

STUDENT EVALUATION: ASSIGNMENTS, TYPES & WEIGHTS

Mrs. Minehart will communicate with students regarding assignment feedback and grading through the free online grading system, Schoology. The teacher will provide students with more detailed information and access to the Theology of the Body: Foundations course page.

2. Class Participation: 25% of the grade

Quizzes: 25% of the grade.
Essays: 25% of the grade

The virtual classroom will provide students with interactive audio, text chat and an interactive whiteboard in which texts, diagrams, video and other media can be displayed and analyzed. We will provide students with a link (via email) that will enable students to join the virtual classroom.
