## Euler's Formula for Polyhedra

One of the most remarkable and significant mathematical equations is Euler's Formula for Polyhedra. It led to the development of a whole new branch of mathematics that helps us to understand scientific occurrences, such as the behavior of enzymes in DNA, the chaos of motion of celestial bodies, and more! This formula, discovered by Leonhard Euler, states the circumstance of a polyhedra three-dimensional figure. What is polyhedra? It is the plural of polyhedron, meaning a flat-faced and polygonal figure, with sharp corners, edges made of straight lines, and no openings. The equation is as follows: F - E + V = 2. 'V' represents the number of vertices of the polyhedra, 'E' the number of edges, and 'F' the number of faces. The formula shows that each of these characteristics of polyhedra are related. Examples of polyhedra include tetrahedrons and pyramids.

In the midst of Switzerland in 1758, Leonhard Euler invented the polyhedra formula. His 7 father taught him mathematics, and at a young age he was an excellent math scholar. In fact, he ended up earning his bachelor's and master's degrees before he was 20! Not only did he assist greatly in the field of mathematics, but Euler also advanced the knowledge of and work in music theory, astronomy, physics, and more! Those in algebra will appreciate that he also invented the function notation, that is, f(x), or 'f of x', a very commonly used notation. Evidently, he was first to realize that the relationship between the characteristics of polyhedra, as shown in his equation, equals two. Euler wrote a letter to a friend mentioning his findings, and only later did he publish a couple of papers explaining and giving proofs for his discovery and method. When giving his proof, Euler did not look at the polyhedra as graphs. Instead, by taking apart the unit into smaller segments, he attempted to back up his work. As this did not count as thorough proof, his formula was not counted as correct. However later, Legendre from France produced a metric proof to back Euler up.

The most famous and important use of this formula was the discovery of topology. Topology is concerned with how spaces are organized, structured, and connected. The spaces in topology are called topological spaces. Some people call it rubber-sheet geometry. In topology of two dimensions, circles and squares are virtually the same. For example, a rubber band can be easily made into a square and circle. But a figure-eight cannot be made into a circle or square without breaking.


Euler's formula has changed somewhat over time and has been used for many different things. For example, for DNA polyhedra, people have altered Euler's formula to S + U = C + 2. His formula has also been used to check whether a graph is a planar graph, check the connectivity of the graph, and to design computer chips. Even today, Euler's formula for polyhedra is used for all sorts of things.

With so many incredible uses and a fascinating purpose, this formula is not something to be missed. As the very center of topology, we could not do nearly as well without it. Through engineering, which directly affects our safety, and robotics, which may very well be at the front of our future, this equation is all around us. Look out for it! Leonhard Euler did a tremendous favor in sharing this with the rest of the world.

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The red rose:




Already, the gladiator's breath slows, rattles...



That's all of my Christmas music suggestions for this year. May you all have a very Merry Christmas, and remember the truth, beauty, and goodness of the season. Merry Christmas!







### Isabella S. (Design Team)
