REQUIRED COURSE MATERIALS:

Teaching art online is a unique learning experience to navigate. If at all possible, buy the version of supply linked below. I can help students navigate obstacles more effectively when we are all using the same materials. If you have any questions regarding supplies, please feel free to email me.

*EpocCam (<u>link</u>) is an app for the iPhone that turns your phone into a document camera. Ipevo has an app for Android phone (<u>link</u>), but I have not used it. Paired with a tension arm like this (<u>link</u>), and you have a very affordable alternative to a dedicated document camera. It will automatically link to Zoom.

**If you already have a full set of watercolors, you may use those. It would be ideal if the colors are similar to the colors in the link.

CLASSIC CHILDREN'S BOOK ILLUSTRATION COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Are there stories within you that you would like to tell? Learn to illuminate your very own narrative in the style of beloved children's books with the help of this course. We will discover why these beautiful illustrations exude warmth, kindness, and creativity, and then will adapt their simple yet timeless style to our own personal masterpieces.

What is it about those classic children's book illustrations that open a door to another world? One where we can imagine tromping through the Hundred Acre Wood with Christopher Robin, or waltzing through an English Cottage Garden on the heels of Benjamin Bunny? While it could take a lifetime to fully understand the magical grasp these little images have on us, this fall we will begin that journey! We will explore how a stroke of the pen can open the imagination, our memories, and even whole new worlds.

We will begin our studies by focusing on the illustrations of E.H. Shepard's *Winnie-the-Pooh* and the paintings, drawings and illustrations of Beatrix Potter, the author and illustrator of the beloved *Peter Rabbit* book series.

We will study their art and pictures and begin to articulate what it might be that sets these works apart. From there we will begin creating characters and narratives of our own, taking cues from the worlds around us—as they did from theirs—and using this as a basis for our own illustrations. While we won't be able to do all our hearts desire in one semester, we will put ourselves on a path that may help us beyond the confines of our class and give us a taste of what we may someday create.

Our class time will be comprised of demonstrations, individual instruction, work-time, and class discussion. Students do not need any prior art experience. The class will start simple dealing with foundational principles. Course material will gradually build in complexity, ending with emphasis on working from observation, creating dynamic compositions, and color mixing. Students will practice *thinking* like an artist. They will engage in the whole creative process from generating ideas, making intentional decisions with each aspect of their work, and reflecting on what they have made.

Students will be encouraged to practice exercises taught in class and may need to work outside of class to complete projects.

Along with hands-on studio work, students will participate in regular class critiques, creating a forum for the group to constructively collaborate and discuss creative outcomes. Students can also expect ongoing dialogues and study of classical illustrations.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS: EXECUTIVE FUNCTION SKILLS

Students are expected to arrive to class on time with their needed materials prepped and ready to use. Students are expected to listen attentively and participate actively in class discussions and exercises. Each individual is responsible for staying up-to-date with classwork/assignments and for taking the initiative to reach out when in need of help.

Unless due to emergency or illness, students are expected to communicate absences with me at least a full day prior to the class in question. Unexcused absences and tardiness will affect the student's class participation grade.

STUDENT EVALUATION: GRADING

I will be providing feedback/critique constantly through zoom as well as in writing. In addition to this, I will assign the following grades to the student's level of achievement: *magna cum laude* (with great praise); *cum laude* (with praise); *satis* (sufficient, satisfactory) and *non satis* (not sufficient).

Ideally, every average student working diligently should do praiseworthy work (cum laude). Those who excel beyond this expectation will be the *magna cum laude* students. Students who do adequate but not praiseworthy work be designated *satis*. *Non satis* means lacking sufficiency or adequacy.

STUDENT EVALUATION: MASTERY PORTRAIT

At the completion of this course *cum laude* students will be able to...

- Operate successfully in a studio setting and care for their materials
- Complete all of the assigned projects and exercises
- Come to class ready to learn and engage in the process of artmaking.
- Will be active in class discussions and will be able to follow directions well.
- Will be curious and eager to learn.
- Articulate different types of compositions and set up compositions of their own
- Critique their own and other's art in an informed manner
- Create original characters and place them into stories
- Develop narratives for their characters
- Create original paintings and drawings

Students will be evaluated in the following categories:

- 1. Class Participation: 30%
- 2. Homework and Exercises: 20%
- 3. Projects: 50%

STUDENT EVALUATION: ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

Students will spend the majority of the class creating original pieces of art. Claiming someone else's work as your own is a serious and punishable offense. A plagiarized assignment will result in a failing grade.

THE VIRTUAL CLASSROOM:

We will be using the free online "virtual classroom" software provided by Zoom, one of the leading companies that provides such software. The virtual classroom will provide students with interactive audio, text chat and an interactive whiteboard in which texts, diagrams, video and other media can be displayed and analyzed. We will provide students with a link (via email) that will enable students to join the virtual classroom.

Students will submit documents by scanning and uploading them to their personal computer, then attaching those files as .pdfs to an email. They will submit their work to the Canvas assignment page (access granted after enrollment is secured).
