Prerequisites: 5th to 9th graders who have an interest in reading in community for the summer (parents welcome)

This summer, I welcome 5th to 9th graders to join us for one or both sessions of C.S. Lewis book reading from *The Chronicles of Narnia* series. Session A will read *The Magician's Nephew* and Session B will read *The Last Battle*. These books will change students' lives and, in the meantime, teach them how to read with delight, depth, and skill, as well as prepare them to write well. There are no required assignments. All that is asked is that you come and participate with delight and joy in reading and discussion in community. These books are written with many Christian themes. We will discuss how the book relates to God's Word and our own lives. It is my hope that the books will encourage students to grow in their faith and relationship with God as a result of the book and our study together. This year, the sessions will be 1 hour and 15 minutes to allow for further background information, summaries, vocabulary, discussion and analysis of the book.

Summer Book Club Sessions: (July 11th to August 3rd)

Sessions 1 hour and 15 minutes in length

Book Club A: The Magician's Nephew (Tuesdays/Thursdays 10:30 am EST)

Book Club B: Prince Caspian (Tuesday/Thursdays 12:30 pm EST)

Sessions meet on: July 11, 13, 18, 20, 25, 27 & August 1, 3

The goal of these sessions is to help students develop the following habits:

- Taking notes in their books (annotation)
- Retelling the story orally
- Summarizing
- Creating their own questions
- Keeping notes book-wide on the great ideas that animate the book
- Engaging with questions that stimulate discussion about thematic material
- Answering different types of questions, such as reading questions, which develop close-reading skills
- Answering life questions that apply to the material
- Memorizing important quotations (optional)
- Writing a strong essay at the book's end, like a persuasive or comparison essay (optional)
- Identifying figurative language and literary devices
- Seeing connections in literature to the Bible and their personal relationship with God
- Reading a book to learn moral lessons and develop virtues
- Sharing thoughts and insights
- Building vocabulary

Student Expectations: Summer reading aims to cultivate a communal love and exploration of story, reading, and journaling. Class time will sometimes be spent reading aloud as a group, as well as sharing each student's reflections and musings from their reading journal.

Students will be encouraged to keep a three-ring binder/reading journal with the following tabs:

• Vocabulary, Questions, Musings (contemplative journaling)

Book Summaries from Progeny Press:

The Magician's Nephew:

When Polly Plummer meets Digory Kirke, he is very unhappy. His father is away in India, and he and his mother, who is very ill, have moved to London to live with an aunt and uncle. Digory is convinced that his Uncle Andrew is either mad, or has a very important secret. Though he's been warned to stay away from Uncle Andrew's study, he's heard strange noises coming from the room late at night.

Digory and Polly become friends, and because of the cold, wet summer days, they are forced to play indoors. While exploring a tunnel that connects their houses, the children accidentally find themselves in Uncle Andrew's study, and Uncle Andrew seems far too delighted to see the children. Uncle Andrew's experiment will send the children to strange other worlds, but an encounter with the sinister Queen Jadis brings evil to the land of Narnia on the day of its creation. Digory, meanwhile, may have a chance to heal his mother, but will he pass the test?

The Last Battle:

The final book of the Chronicles of Narnia. When Shift, a lazy, devious ape, finds a lion skin, he tricks Puzzle, a goodhearted but simple donkey, into wearing it. Soon, Narnia is full of stories of the return of Aslan, lion lord of Narnia, but an Aslan who seems harsh and almost cruel. When King Tirian goes to investigate, he finds cruel Calormenes enslaving his subjects in the name of Aslan. With his few remaining loyal subjects and two children from Narnia's distant past, Tirian faces Narnia's final battle and the end of his treasured land. As Narnia dissolves in shooting stars and darkness and ice swallows it, the faithful are guided through a door with Aslan into a world of beauty. Their hearts leap and a wild hope ignites in them as they run further up and further into the glories and wonder of Aslan's country. As Aslan tells them, "The dream is ended: this is the morning."

The Virtual Classroom:
