Class Description:

In this class we will learn and review vocabulary in context by working through and translating the writings of some of the most influential writers in German literature.

We will then compare and contrast translating word-to-word versus meaning-to-meaning.

This will allow us to look deeper into the meaning of the writings. The following contemplation and discussion on the writings will take place in English. Therefore, only a beginning intermediate knowledge of German in necessary for the class.
