


Ember's End Summer Book Club (The Green Ember Book 4)



The *Ember's End* book club offers a fun setting where students can enjoy the love of reading together — with the help of the fourth and final book in the *Green Ember* series! This series, written by beloved author S.D. Smith, is a favorite of homeschooling Christian families given its exploration of virtues in the exciting exploits of its two main characters: the endearing rabbit siblings Heather and Picket.

The fourth book is the culmination of an exciting adventure in which rabbit siblings Heather and Picket save their family and friends. As they continue to find their way together in unfamiliar territory, they must remain faithful and trust their instincts while searching for the truth, and navigating the good and evil that surround them.

Students will read this novel over the course of five weeks, discussing the book in a restful and interactive setting. Several fun activities will help students connect with each other and the story. Attention will be devoted to topics that interest students the most!

The plot twists and character conflicts throughout the book are suspenseful, captivating, intriguing, and inspiring. Students will be given the opportunity to wrestle with how they would navigate the unknown, the virtues that correspond to each path taken, and if they would react the way Heather, Picket, and other characters do. I'm so eager to share this fourth book — another inspiring story about the faith, hope, bravery, strength, and love of these two special rabbits — with students and their families!

Discussions will be thought-provoking and expose students to key elements of literature, teach literary analysis without formal assignments, and grow rhetorical insight. Through our student management system *Canvas*, students also will be able to continue to chat informally about the book with their peers on our class discussion board!

Classes will cover the whole book and be supplemented by songs, coloring pages, maps, opportunities to draw, a list of applicable literary terms and devices, and other fun materials that will help students connect with each other, along with the characters and stories.

Our final class together will be spent listening to everyone's final projects. Students will be invited to choose from an array of fun culminating activities that will enhance learning and allow further discovery through creative expression. I also am hoping that S.D. Smith will join us on our last day!

Class Activities:

Students will interact with the book and each other in several ways to experience the full reach of the story, themes, and characters. These activities include:

- Reading Journals
- Read Aloud
- Socratic Discussions
- Literary Terms and Devices
- Informal Canvas Discussion Board
- Map & Character Sketches
- Coloring Pages
- Culminating Project: Sing a song; Create a board game; Create a vintage photo scene; Make a diorama; Write and illustrate a poem; Design a movie poster; Create a Calligram; Write and illustrate a children's story; Act out a play!

We will be using the free online "virtual classroom" software provided by Zoom. The virtual classroom will provide students with interactive audio and video, along with an interactive whiteboard in which writing, diagrams, video, and other media can be displayed and analyzed.
