

"As you wish," said Jacu, and the voices faded away.

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

#### The Lightkeeper: Book Review

Christ is in our midst! In this column, I would love to share with you all a book that I got for Christmas: The LightKeeper. This book has such a beautiful story; its plot a complicated, twisted web with intriguing series of events which click together in time. The Lightkeeper is a mix of sci-fi and romance, and it also references the sign of the Cross even though it isn't clear if the main character is Orthodox or not.

The main character is an ageless and nameless girl that travels through time to tend lighthouses that are in need of her; either the lightkeeper of the respective lighthouse is gone, injured, or even dead. She has tended many lighthouses; she has been to Gurnet Point, Plymouth Harbor, Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1776; Little Red Lighthouse, Hudson River, NYC, 2010; Colossus, Rhodes, Greece, 226 BC, just to name a few. The Lightkeeper (as the girl is called before she is named) does not remember how she came to be who she is, nor does she remember her childhood, or having a family. She is human, but she isn't capable of feeling pain, and she is basically immortal, always moving through time. Because of that, she doesn't have a permanent home. As time goes by, she starts feeling lonely. Because of her position, whenever she encounters people they look at her as a good ghost or sweet dream, and if she encounters someone in a crowd or city, they either forget her altogether or they remember her as a distant, pleasant memory. As the story goes on, a beautiful but complex connection is made, which leaves you to contemplate the mysteries of this world.

The Lightkeeper was definitely a good read, and I highly recommend it. It is found on Ancient Faith, the ISBN is 978-1-944967-89-5. It has some violent scenes, a little bit of romance, and slight cussing. I hope you all enjoy it as much as I have!

## Account of the Presentation of Our Lord into the Temple By Elizaveta Durka

Dear Reader,

Today we celebrate the Presentation of the Lord into the Temple. Forty days after His birth, Jesus was brought to the Temple in Jerusalem to be presented to the Lord. According to the Law of Moses, a woman who gave birth to a male child was forbidden to enter the Temple for forty days. At the end of her purification, the mother went to the Temple with the child to offer a sacrifice. The Most Holy Virgin, though not needing purification, fulfilled the Law out of humility.

The righteous Elder Simeon, who had been promised by the Holy Spirit that he would not die until he saw the Messiah, went to the Temple at that moment. He received Jesus in his arms and thanked God, saying, "Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, according to Thy word, for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation" (Luke 2:29-32). He also prophesied to the Virgin Mary about Jesus' future and her own suffering. Saint Anna the Prophetess, an 84-year-old widow, also gave thanks to the Lord and spoke of Him to those seeking redemption.

Church hymnographers have adorned this Feast with their hymns over the centuries. Today, we also commemorate the Icon of the Most Holy Theotokos known as "the Softening of Evil Hearts" or "Simeon's Prophecy," symbolizing the fulfillment of Simeon's prophecy. During the divine services of this great feast, we sing:

Hail, Virgin Theotokos, full of grace; for from you has shone forth the Sun of Righteousness, Christ our God, giving light to those in darkness. Be glad, O righteous Elder; for you received in your arms the Redeemer of our souls, Who bestows upon us resurrection.
