

Mark Twain's Joan of Arc is not your typical saint's biography. Written as a fictional memoir through the narrative lens of Joan's childhood friend and military secretary, Louis de Contes, Twain turned his own 12 years of factual research into a literary masterpiece and what he considered his finest work.

In this book club, we will journey together with St. Joan of Arc from her childhood to her martyrdom as she answers God's call to save France from English occupation during the Hundred Years' War. Additionally, Mark Twain is known for his poignant use of caricature in his novels to, at times, embellish the truth, but more profoundly, to create a depth within his characters that we can all find relatable. In this club, students will also create written and artistic caricatures based on characters in the story as well as those from their own personal experiences.

Through reading, writing, art, and emotion, students will have an up-close look into the heart of a young woman of very little education but very great faith and confidence in God and trust in His divine providence.


